1	Understand how an IF Statement relates to a Trigger in Minecraft	Starter: Trigger Pairs (2 packs required) Place students in pairs or small groups with their pack of coding cards. Ask students to separate their IF (Trigger) cards from each pack, shuffle them and randomly lay the cards on the ground face down. Taking turns each student turns over two cards hoping for a match. If they don't match, they turn the cards back over; then it is the next player's turn. If a player gets a match they keep going. The player with the most matches wins. There is no knowledge checks in these sections as students are required to complete more complex in-game activities. 9 - 10	Develop a functioning mini-game that helps solve a problem.	Students must design and build a mini-game that helps to find a solution to a problem. You may choose to theme the game based on another learning area or a local/social justice issue. Start by designing the game on paper with drawings of the game and a list of algorithms written to explain what will happen to the player. Students can choose to build in a desired bio word or use the build areas in the training word.  Assessment:  The form the assessment takes will depend on the unit's learning intentions and the ability to integrate the unit with other subject areas.  Assessment does not need to be one big task. It can consist of/include all of the components/stages made available in this program along the way.  The final product (the game) is probably less important than the journey to get there.
